



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District Map



While incorporated farms make up just over a third of Canadian farm operations most of those are also family-run corporations. If the issue of farm succession planning is not on the minds of Canadian farm producers, it probably should be. That same Statistics Canada Census of Agriculture indicates that the average age of a Canadian farmer is 56 years of age with the 55 plus age group becoming the fastest growing segment in Canadian agriculture. Despite these statistics, the same Census reports that only 1 in 10 Canadian farm operations have a formal succession plan. While each farm has its unique issues when it comes to transferring the business to the next generation, there are some common topics that almost all farmers must address. Resolutions Procedures

- Only the 'Resolved' portion of resolution will be read.
- The Resolutions Committee may redraft and/or consolidate resolutions received to enhance their understandability and facilitate consideration at the annual meeting. To facilitate this process, the Committee shall meet prior to and during the annual meeting as resolutions are received.
- Only delegates are entitled to move, second, and vote on resolutions.
- · All delegates moving and/or speaking to resolutions will identify themselves to the Chair.
- Only the mover is asked to speak to the motion.
- The remarks of speakers to resolutions will be limited to 5 minutes.
- The Chair will read the motion before voting occurs if the motion has been amended.
- Resolutions may not necessarily be dealt with in order of listing; i.e., certain resolutions may be brought forward to be considered at the time topics to which they relate are under discussion.
- Members of the Resolutions Committee will be allowed to move to the floor to speak about resolutions.
- The deadline for resolutions was January 4, 2024.
- After the deadline, resolutions will be considered only if agreed to by the meeting. A motion must be made to bring late resolutions to the floor.
- Resolutions received by the KAP office 5 working days prior to the AGM are included in the online program. Resolutions received after this will be on a PowerPoint presentation, showing original resolution and any amendments.
- · Privileges of the floor will be extended to visitors to the meeting.

Sunsetting Resolutions

- Resolutions will sunset after a period of 5 years.
- All resolutions from 2019 will be sunsetting at the 2024 AGM unless reaffirmed by a district or commodity association.

January 2024 Annual Meeting Resolutions

1. Renewable Diesel – District #1

Whereas companies are making net zero or even zero by 2025 pledges to the Science Based Targets initiative (SBTi) which have large ramifications for Scope 3 (supply chain) emissions; and,

Whereas renewable diesel meets the same ASTM standards as diesel; and,

Whereas renewable fuels are being promoted for non-essential activities (e.g., air travel); and,

Whereas renewable fuel has a limited size opportunity due to constrained by-product sources and for the competition of many oilseeds for food; now, therefore be it

Resolved, that KAP lobby the Government of Canada and the Government of Manitoba to ensure that renewable diesel is the preferred fuel for agriculture, letting us be one step closer to net zero.

2. Conservation Officers - District #6

Whereas hunting violations in Manitoba are a concern for producers; now, therefore be it

Resolved, that KAP lobby the Government of Manitoba to hire more conservation officers who are offered competitive salaries to deal with hunting violations.

3. Drones and Agriculture Research – District #3

Whereas agriculture research in Manitoba is being done using drones; and,

Whereas some jurisdictions allow for active chemical ingredients in testing using drones; and,

Whereas limited data currently exists for the Pest Management Regulatory Agency (PMRA) to allow for a broader application of pesticides using drones; and,

Whereas the PMRA is currently undergoing a transformation process; now, therefore be it

Resolved, that KAP lobby the Pest Management Regulatory Agency to amend the Pest Control Products Regulations which would allow for greater flexibility, timeliness and simplicity for the application of pesticides using drones for research purposes.

4. Canada Grain Act Discussion Group – District 12

Whereas Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada has initiated a review of the Canada Grain Act (CGA); and,

Whereas the CGA was introduced in the early 1900s to bring balance in the relationship between farmers and the grain industry with regulatory provisions that historically provided farmers with the surety of being treated fairly in their dealings with grain companies; and,

Whereas the oversight role of the Canadian Grain Commission (CGC) has been significantly diminished in recent decades; and,

Whereas the CGA review is of importance as it will impact the relationship between farmers and the grain industry into the future; and,

Whereas the recommendations advanced by key farm organizations are similar; now, therefore be it

Resolved, that KAP, in cooperation with relevant stakeholders, jointly organize a Canada Grain Act Summit to review common CGA policy objectives and to develop and endorse common CGA policy recommendations that maintain the effectiveness and integrity of both the Canada Grain Act and the Canadian Grain Commission to act in the interests of producers; and be it further

Resolved, that the common CGA policy recommendations from the summit be communicated to the Minister of Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada and the three CGC Commissioners with the request for a follow-up meeting.

5. PTH 311 Bridge – District 4

Whereas PTH 311 is a major connecting artery between Hwy 59 and Hwy 12, serving the busy economic catchment area of Steinbach; and,

Whereas the bridge on the Manning Canal on PTH 311 was destroyed by fire in the summer of 2023, along with the next bridge to the north beside the canal; and,

Whereas traffic has been detoured to PR 206 and municipal road 40 N resulting in a significant increase in traffic volumes on Hwy 52; and,

Whereas detouring a significant amount of highway traffic onto a gravel road causes concerns for the safe movement of field equipment, and for vehicles attempting to access Hwy 52; and,

Whereas the movement of emergency services is of utmost importance in the area; now, therefore be it

Resolved, that KAP lobby the Department of Transportation and Infrastructure to prioritize the replacement of the bridge on the Manning Canal on PTH 311 as well as install a temporary canal crossing.

6. Expanding Natural Gas Capacity – District 4

Whereas expansion and increased access of natural gas into more areas of rural Manitoba would be an economic benefit to agricultural producers, including reduction of grain drying costs for corn growers and other producers who rely on artificial drying to maximize profitability through harvest management and maintaining grain quality; and,

Whereas expansion and increased access of natural gas would be of economic benefit to the province of Manitoba and help drive growth, including making Manitoba more competitive and attractive to agricultural industries and other businesses; and,

Whereas other provinces are also expanding natural gas access, including the province of Ontario who recently announced the passing of Bill 32, The Access to Natural Gas Act, allowing for a mix of investment options and to clear regulatory blocks to fund and expand natural gas access to more parts of rural and northern Ontario; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, that KAP develop a plan with key industry stakeholders with the goal to expand natural gas capacity in rural Manitoba to provide economic and competitive benefits to producers, the agricultural sector and Manitoba as a whole.

7. Permission for Hunting – District 4

Resolved, that KAP lobby for a mandatory annual written permission form for hunting on private land be included in the Hunter's Guide.

8. Law Enforcement surrounding Animal Activists – District 4

Whereas there has been an increase in both the occurrence and extremism of actions taken by animal rights activists against farmers that include breaking the law to highlight their beliefs; and,

Whereas there is concern that this extreme activism is spreading into regions and mediums that have not been targeted in the past; and,

Whereas animal rights activists are abolitionists who are focused on ending all animal use, rather than improving animal welfare; and,

Whereas an individual's Charter rights must be respected, and the goal is not to prevent legal protest activity, freedom of expression or speech; and,

Whereas animal rights activists do not have a right to intimidate, harass, trespass, break and enter, interrupt farming businesses, and/or break the law; and,

January 2024 Annual Meeting Resolutions

Whereas our livestock farmers and their families are fearful and threatened by the recent actions of animal rights activists; and,

Whereas there needs to be real repercussions, such as charges laid and convictions made, if illegal animal rights activists' activities are to be curbed; and,

Whereas the Government of Alberta recently announced amendments coming to Alberta legislation to combat animal rights activism threats, which include;

Petty Trespass to Property Act:

Amendment to be made to specifically address trespassing on agricultural land. Penalties to increase under the act to up to \$10,000 for a first offence and up to \$25,000 for a second offence. Organizations could be fined up to \$200,000. Trespassers could also face imprisonment of up to 6 months.

Animal Health Act:

Amendment to address the costs farmers may incur through biosecurity breaches. Penalties for trespassers who breach biosecurity protocols on agricultural operations can be fined \$15,000 for a first offence and \$30,000 plus one-year imprisonment for repeat offences.

Provincial Offences Procedures Act:

Increase maximum amount of compensation awarded by the court to \$100,000; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, that KAP lobby the Government of Manitoba to enhance and fully enforce laws around intimidation, trespass, break & enter, and mischief towards farmers and lay charges to the fullest extent against those that break the law.

9. Grain Dryer Certification – District 4

Whereas producers' use of grain dryers can lead to improvement of quality and marketability of harvested grain, and is a management option in years of difficult harvest conditions, where both can maximize producers' profitability; and,_

Whereas the Government of Manitoba is leading an initiative to reduce red tape and improve regulatory accountability as part of its plan to fix the finances, repair the services and rebuild the provincial economy and has introduced measures to define, implement and track progress on reducing red tape and regulatory requirements; and,

Whereas Manitoba, and other provinces such as Saskatchewan, use the Canadian Standards Association regulations where grain dryers are expected to meet the CSA 3.8 standard, but interpretation and application of the regulations are not consistent between Office of the Fire Commissioner inspectors; and

Whereas this issue of interpretation and application of regulations related to certification of grain dryers has been an on-going issue in Manitoba since 2012 and where resolutions were made to KAP in 2014 to address clarity and timeliness of grain dryer certifications; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, that KAP continue to lobby the Office of the Fire Commissioner, Manitoba Infrastructure and Manitoba Agriculture in providing clarity to the interpretation and application of the Canadian Standards Association regulations as to ensure producers have access to both new and used grain dryers and to increase the number and speed of grain dryer certifications in Manitoba.

10. Landowners' Rights & Trespassing – District 4

Whereas trespassers can create new risks to landowners and livestock operations by introducing soil borne diseases such as clubroot, verticillium wilt or herbicide tolerant weeds like glyphosate resistant kochia or livestock diseases like PED virus which could threaten producers' livelihoods; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, that KAP lobby the Government of Manitoba and Manitoba's Minister of Justice to introduce legislation that would make trespassing on farmland a chargeable offence.

11. Developing Information Resources for the Movement of Farm Machinery and Equipment – District 4

Whereas the Government of Manitoba, Manitoba Infrastructure and other governments are updating regulations and highway permitting requirements; and,

Whereas many producers are unaware of these changes to various regulations as they apply to the movement of farm machinery, equipment and goods; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, that KAP work with the various provincial government departments to develop a document and/or website that explains in simple language the new and existing regulations that apply to the movement of farm equipment, machinery and commodities.

Honourable Lawrence MacCaulay

Minister of Agriculture and Agri-Food *Government of Canada*

The Honourable Lawrence MacAulay is the Member of Parliament for Cardigan. He was first elected to the House of Commons in 1988, to represent Cardigan in eastern Prince Edward Island, and won his 11th consecutive election in 2021. He has previously served as Minister of Veterans Affairs and Associate Minister of National Defence.

Minister MacAulay's Cabinet roles have also included Minister of Agriculture and Agri-Food, Solicitor General of Canada, Minister of Labour, Secretary of State for Veterans, and Secretary of State for the Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency.

He has also served as critic for Fisheries and Oceans, and for Seniors. In addition, he was Vice-Chair of the House of Commons Standing Committee on Fisheries and Oceans.

Minister MacAulay was born on September 9, 1946, in St. Peter's Bay, Prince Edward Island, and worked previously as a farmer and businessman.

He and Frances Elaine O'Connell were married in 1972. They have three daughters: Carolyn, Rita, and Lynn.



Honourable Ron Kostyshyn

Minister of Agriculture Governemnt of Manitoba

Ron Kostyshyn was first elected as the MLA for Swan River from 2011 to 2016, and was elected as the MLA for Dauphin in 2023.

He previously served as the provincial minister of agriculture and as the reeve for Mossey River Municipality. During his first tenure as agriculture minister, Kostyshyn helped to improve food safety and support Manitoba producers. He has also served on various boards including the Association of Manitoba Municipalities, Manitoba Conservation Commission, Intermountain Conservation District, Ethelbert District Veterinary Board and Farm Stewardship Association of Manitoba.

He and his wife, Judy, raised two daughters and ran a family mixed farming operation for 40 years in rural Manitoba.

Provincial Communications Lead STARS

Blake Robert joined STARS in 2021 as the Provincial Communications Lead, serving as a spokesperson for the organization in Manitoba and across Western Canada. Having previously worked in government and the private sector in Alberta and Manitoba, he is honoured to be part of the STARS team and their life-saving mission to deliver critical care, anywhere.



Todd Lewis

Vice President Canadian Federation of Agriculture

Todd Lewis is a director and Second Vice-President for the Canadian Federation of Agriculture (CFA). Lewis' family farm was established in 1904 near the hamlet of Gray, Saskatchewan, just south of Regina. He farms grain, canola, lentils and other crops alongside his twin brother, Rod.

Lewis joined APAS in 2006 when he was a Councilor for the RM of Lajord. In 2009, Lewis was elected to the APAS Board of Directors, and in 2016, was elected President. He said he got involved with APAS because he feels agriculture needed a bigger and louder voice in Saskatchewan.



Honourable Robert Black Senator (Ontario)

The Honourable Rob Black has worked in the rural, agricultural, and leadership arenas for much of his working career.

He has had close involvement in 4-H and other leadership programs, such as Junior Farmers and the Advanced Agricultural Leadership Program (AALP). He credits his involvement in these programs with allowing him to develop the skills that would lead him to apply to be a senator. He has been involved in 4-H for almost 50 years in all aspects of the program, at the local, provincial and national levels and is a Past President of the Canadian 4-H Council.

Rob was Ward 5 Representative on Wellington County Council. He has also been Manager of the Ontario Research and Development Challenge Fund, and President of the Ontario Agricultural Hall of Fame Association and the Wellington County Historical Society.

Rob worked with the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food, and Rural Affairs (OMAFRA) for 15 years. Following his time at OMAFRA, he spent 5 years as the Executive Director of 4-H Ontario. Rob then accepted the role of Executive Director of The Centre for Rural Leadership, which morphed in to the Rural Ontario Institute (ROI).

In 2012, in recognition of Rob's significant contributions to 4-H across Canada over many years, he received the Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal. In 2013, Rob was awarded the Outstanding Leadership Program Director Award from the International Association of Programs for Agricultural Leadership (IAPAL) and in 2016, Rob was made an Honourary Member of the Canadian 4-H Council.

Rob applied to be a senator in July 2016, after some prompting from his son, Tayler. In February 2018 he received a call from the Prime Minister, summoning him to the Senate to represent the province of Ontario. The Prime Minister told Rob specifically that he wanted him to bring his background in agriculture, rural community development, and leadership development to the Senate.

On February 27, 2018, Rob was sworn in as a senator representing the province of Ontario. Since then, he has been working on several issues of importance to Canadians through his role and is a member of the Standing Committees on Agriculture and Forestry; Rules, Procedures and the Rights of Parliament; and, the Joint Committee on the Library of Parliament. Senator Black has been the Chair of the Canadian Senators Group (CSG) since its inception.

In July 2021, the Canadian Produce Marketing Association recognized Senator Black as the 2021 Produce Champion. The annual Produce Champion award is given to a Member of Parliament or Senator who has been supportive of the produce industry and effective at bringing industry issues to the forefront on Parliament Hill.

Rob and his wife Julie live north of Fergus, ON and have four grown children and three grandsons.



Andrea Faubert

Director of Government and Industry Relations *Corteva Agriscience*

Andrea Faubert is the Director of Government and Industry Relations for Corteva Agriscience in Canada. In her role, Andrea leads policy development supporting Corteva's seed and crop protection business units as well as Corteva's network of domestic manufacturing and R&D facilities. Andrea has a decade of experience working in federal and provincial governments. Most recently, Andrea served as the Director of Policy and Stakeholder Relations for Ontario's Minister of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs. 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

- 2 lbs (8) chicken drumsticks 3 Tbsp prepared hoisin sauce
- 2 Tbsp soy sauce
- 1 tsp sesame oil 1 Tbsp finely chopped ginger
- 1 tsp garlic powder
- 1/2 tsp red pepper flakes
- 1 Tbsp sesame seeds (garnish)

PREPARATION

Preheat oven to 400F. In a large bowl, whisk together hoisin sauce, soy sauce, sesame oil, chopped ginger, garlic powder and red pepper flakes. Add the chicken and toss to coat evenly. Refrigerate to marinate, for 15 min.

Place chicken on a baking sheet lined with foil or a rack and bake for 45 min, turning halfway, until thoroughly cooked

For crispier chicken, broil for 2-3 minutes at the end, taking care not to burn

Top with sesame seeds and serve with stir fried vegetables. Notes: This recipe can also be prepared on

the BBQ.

Chicken pieces are fully cooked when a meat thermometer inserted into the thickest part of the drumstick reads 165F.

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
